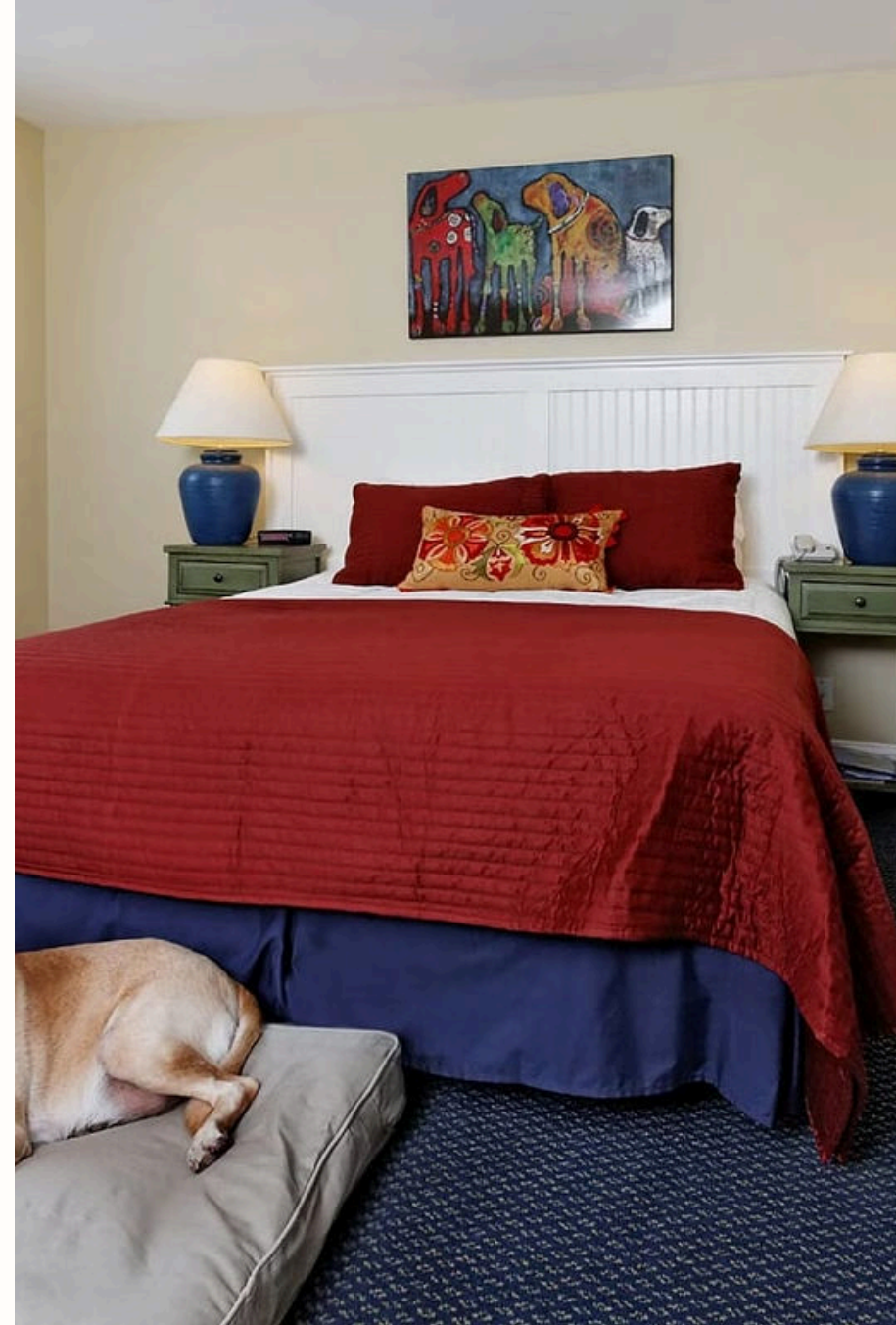

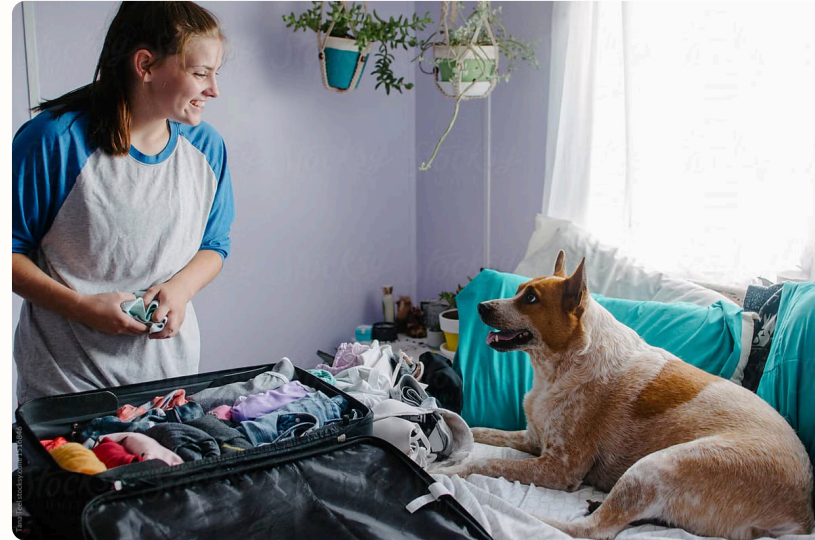


# Packing for Your Pet's Needs
